Stage: Launched 17 September

The Skye & Lochalsh Wellbeing and Community Support Directory is part of the Skye and Lochalsh Community Information Hub, a central online space offering easy access to local resources that support everyday life.

Developed through Year 1 research and engagement of the Health, Wellbeing, Welfare and Social Care (HWWS) Collaboration, the directory includes contact details for local charities, volunteer-led groups, national helplines, and statutory services such as NHS Highland, The Highland Council, and emergency services.

It supports individuals, professionals, and organisations with signposting, referrals, and service awareness. Available online at slcvo.org.uk/information-hub, printed copies will also be distributed through GP surgeries, libraries, hospitals, housing associations, and other key service points across the area.

Distress Brief Intervention - local provision for young people

Stage: feasibility

Partners: SLCVO, NHS Highland Child and Adolescent Mental Health Services (CAMHS), Change Menta Health, Education, **Third Sector Groups**

Distress Brief Intervention (DBI) is a national programme in Scotland that provides early, compassionate support to individuals aged 16+ experiencing emotional distress. DBI aims to reduce pressure on emergency services and improve mental health outcomes through timely, person-centred intervention.

DBI in Inverness Schools Change Mental Health has successfully adapted the DBI model for Inverness secondary schools. This school-based approach has helped fill gaps in mental health support for young people and complements wider early intervention strategies.

Work is underway to explore the introduction of a school-based DBI model at Portree High School. The aim is to ensure young people in Portree have access to timely, compassionate support that helps them manage distress and stay connected to appropriate services.

Project

Description

Lead Highlands and Islands Climate Hub Participants: Development Trusts, Community Councils, HIE, SLCVO

The Skye & Raasay Renewables Fund working group is progressing toward a long-term vision of establishing a community benefits organisation that can manage current and future renewable energy funds across the area. While initial efforts are focused on benefit funds linked to the Glen Ullinish II and Ben Sca wind farms, the wider ambition is to create a structure that delivers greater returns and long-term value for communities throughout Skye and Raasay.

Support from the Highlands and Islands Climate Hub has helped the group build momentum, clarify its purpose, and begin shaping a shared vision. The next phase involves:

- Developing a clear roadmap for the organisation's structure and governance.
- Engaging communities to ensure transparency, inclusion, and local ownership.
- Identifying opportunities to align with the Skye & Raasay
 Future Area Place Plan.

Community engagement will be central to this process. Plans are being considered for public workshops, surveys, and outreach activities in early 2026 to gather input on priorities, potential projects, and how the fund should be managed. If aligned, there may be scope to secure funding for a dedicated
